Graduate Study at Campion Hall

Campion Hall is the Jesuit Hall in Oxford for graduate students and researchers, combining two of the world's great educational and intellectual traditions, those of the Society of Jesus and the University of Oxford. We seek to hold together the high academic standards of Oxford with Jesuit educational philosophy, to provide a unique environment for learning that nourishes the heart and soul as well as the mind.

The Hall is one of four Permanent Private Halls at the University of Oxford. Founded by the Society of Jesus in 1896, the Hall is now a welcoming home to an international and diverse community of graduate students, fellows, and staff who share the motivation to cultivate wisdom for the common good through transformative learning, research, and engagement.

We welcome postgraduate students working in many different fields, and our resources are especially suited to students in the Humanities and Social Sciences. The Laudato Si' Research Institute, which engages in research addressing the global socio-ecological crisis, is based at the Hall.




Campion Hall?

How to Apply

All applications are made to the University of Oxford centrally (for more information see the University's Graduate Admissions webpages). If a department or faculty accepts your application, you will then be considered for a place at a college or hall. If you are interested in coming to Campion Hall, you will have the opportunity to choose Campion Hall as your preference on your application form.

As admission is competitive and the process can take time, we strongly encourage you to establish deadlines and begin preparing your application early on. Most courses at the University of Oxford have November, January, and March deadlines, and typically, to be considered for scholarships, it is necessary to submit before the January deadline. We advise you to check the relevant course and scholarship pages directly.

Frequently Asked Questions

Who can apply to Campion Hall?

We welcome women and men from all backgrounds who wish to read for a postgraduate degree in the Humanities and Social Sciences at the University of Oxford. A strong undergraduate degree in a relevant subject is essential for admission to all of Oxford's postgraduate programmes, but beyond this the requirements vary by course. What is a Permanent Private Hall? How does it differ from a regular college?

The University of Oxford has 43 colleges and halls. The four Permanent Private Halls (PPHs) were founded by various Christian denominations and still retain their religious character. Members of Campion Hall enjoy the same academic experience as graduates of other colleges, and the familial size of the community allows for conversation and sociability among researchers at all stages of development. Additional cultural and sporting activities may be accessed through our Associate MCR Membership scheme with Pembroke College, our nearest neighbour.

Is there any accommodation available for students?

Students are offered the opportunity to apply for onsite accommodation, usually in one of the one-bedroom flats near the Hall at Norfolk House, for the duration of their study. They are not, however, required to live onsite if they wish to make their own arrangements, and non-resident students are invited to participate fully in Hall life.

What are the meals like at Campion Hall?

All students are welcome to have meals in the dining hall on a regular basis, at no additional cost. The food is healthy and varied, with accommodation made wherever possible for restricted diets. There are weekly dinners to which guests may be invited, and termly formal dinners, as well as special MCR events.

Is there any financial support available from the Hall?

The Hall offers the opportunity to apply both for small bursaries for those facing unforeseen financial hardship, and for grants for activities related to their research and formation which support their flourishing and professional development during their studies.
